Rules for Playing the Game of LITTLE FOLKS Picture Cards

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FOR 2, 3, OR 4 PLAYERS

Object:

The object of picture cards is to form complete pictures, which are composed of four cards of the same letter. This is accomplished by drawing from the piles in the center of the table. When a player has three "A" cards in his hand and draws a fourth from the center pile, he completes his picture and places it face-up on the table.

Equipment:

There are 48 picture cards with a letter at the top and bottom of each card. Four cards of the same letter form a complete picture. Each picture formed has a title at the bottom of the picture, such as Alice in Wonderland, Three Little Pigs, etc.

Preparation:

A player is chosen to deal the cards. This player shuffles and deals eight cords to each player, one card at a time, keeping the cards face down as

he deals. He then places one card face up to start a discard pile and places the rest of the pack face down alongside of it, to be used as a draw pile.

The Play:

The player to the left of the dealer starts the game by drawing the top card from the face-down pile or the face-up card from the discard pile. He then discards a card from his hand, face-up to the top of the face-up discard pile, or if he has taken the face-up card, starts a new discard pile. When a player on his turn draws a card that will complete a picture, he places this picture on the table and reads the title out loud so that all players may hear.

He may then take all the cards in the face-up discard pile into his hand and form as many additional pictures as he can, placing them on the table and calling out their titles. After he has formed as many pictures as he can with the face-up pile, he keeps four cards in his hand and returns the rest of the cards face-up to form a new discard pile. A player may take the cards in the face-up pile only twice in any one game. Therefore, should this same player on a later turn succeed in drawing a card that completes another picture, he repeats the same procedure as above. After making as many complete pictures as possible, he returns all the remaining cards to the center of the table and the game ends.

Play moves clockwise, each player drawing, playing and discarding in turn. When all cards in the face-down pile have been drawn, the face-up cards are reshuffled and play proceeds as before.

Winning the Game:

When any one player has taken the discard pile for the second time, he forms as many pictures as he can, then returns all unused cards to the table and the game ends.

When the game has ended the player who has made the greatest number of pictures Wins the Game.
