Game consists of a folding PLAYING BOARD, MEN to run the bases, these RULES, and PACK OF FIFTY CARDS

The possibilities of each play are figured out mathematically and the result is quite as natural as that of a Big League Game

Play is started by choosing names for the opposing teams and then writing these names on a score pad. The "Diamond" and men are used as each play indicates.

The cards are thoroughly shuffled and placed face down on a convenient portion of the table.

The opponent whose team is first at the bat, turns over the first card and **READS ALOUD** the first line which gives the result of the first play. The **NUMBER** in the right hand margin of each line read tells **WHAT LINE OF THE NEXT CARD** is to be read for the next play. Each successive play will always be found to correspond with the position of the men already on the bases.

The cards of each inning should be turned over from the original deck onto a separate pile, and when three are out, this second pile is placed on a third pile of cards already used, where they remain until it is time to re-shuffle the pack. This will enable the players to return the cards to the original deck in case the Reader read incorrectly or did something wrongly,

the plays in consequence not working out correctly. The inning can thus be played over and the error be corrected.

The players may agree to re-shuffle all of the cards after every three innings, or they need not be re-shuffled until the entire pack has been used.

When a base runner or batter has been put out, he should be removed from the board.

At the beginning of each inning the first line of the next card should always be read for the first play.
